Having assessed their risk, schools must deliver face-to-face, high-quality education to all pupils. School must comply with health and safety law and put in place proportionate control measures. School must regularly review and update our risk assessments - treating them as 'living documents', as the circumstances in our school and the public health advice changes. This includes having active arrangements in place to monitor whether the controls are effective and working as planned.

Summary of Schools COVID-19 operational guidance August 2021

WJS has reviewed its guidance in accordance with the latest updates, please find below a summary of the key revisions.

Mixing and 'bubbles

The government is no longer recommending that it is necessary to keep pupils in bubbles from the autumn term. Assemblies and other whole school events can therefore resume in September. Schools no longer need to avoid pupils mixing at break and lunch times. School start and finish times for pupils will no longer need to be staggered.

Outbreak Management Plan

Outbreak Management Plan in place to cover the possibility that it may become necessary to reintroduce systems of control previously used for a temporary period.

Tracing close contacts and isolation

From Step 4, close contacts will be identified via NHS Test and Trace and education settings will no longer be expected to undertake contact tracing. From 16 August 2021, children under the age of 18 years old will no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS



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Test and Trace as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case. Adults over the age of 18 who are fully vaccinated will also no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case from 16 August 2021.

Use of face coverings

The government has advised that from Step 4 of the roadmap, face coverings will no longer be advised for secondary phase pupils, staff and visitors in either classrooms or communal areas in all schools; and face coverings will also no longer be recommended to be worn on dedicated transport to school or college and will no longer be legally required on public transport.

Control Measures

Continue to ensure that good hygiene is in place for everyone (frequent and thorough hand cleaning with soap and water or hand sanitiser, and promote the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach); Maintain robust cleaning regimes (regular cleaning of areas and equipment – at least twice per day) and keep all areas of the school well-ventilated.

Asymptomatic testing

Staff should undertake twice weekly home tests whenever they are on site until the end of September, when this will also be reviewed.

Pupil Attendance

All CEV pupils should now attend school unless they are one of the very small number of pupils under paediatric or other specialist care and have been advised by their GP or clinician not to attend. Pupils who live with someone who is CEV should continue to attend school as normal. Schools should use code X if a child is self-isolating or quarantining because of COVID-19 in accordance with relevant legislation or guidance published by PHE or the DHSC.

School workforce - CEV Staff

Clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) people are no longer advised to shield but may wish to take extra precautions to protect themselves, and to follow the practical steps set out in the [CEV guidance](#) to minimise their risk of exposure to the virus. Staff in schools who are CEV should currently attend their place of work if they cannot work from home. DHSC will publish updated guidance before Step 4.



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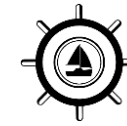
State-funded school inspection

It is intended that Ofsted will return to a full programme of routine inspections from September 2021 and will aim to inspect every state-funded school within the next 5 academic years. This will mean an extension of up to 6 terms in the inspection interval for those schools not inspected since the start of the pandemic. Regulations will give effect to these arrangements.

Accountability expectations

The Government will confirm the position on accountability for academic year 2021/22 in due course.

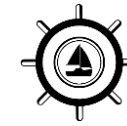

Child should be moved, if possible, to the medical room where they can be isolated behind a closed door, depending on the age of the child and with appropriate adult supervision if required. Ventilation should be maximised by opening the outside door. If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people;3. If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should use a separate bathroom in the medical room. The bathroom should be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone else;4. PPE (medical grade face mask, vinyl gloves, disposable apron, visor) should be worn by staff caring for the child while they await collection and a distance of 2 metres maintained when possible.5. 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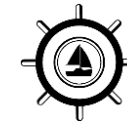
